(Co-)PRESIDENTS' MESSAGE

Dear Members:

We can certainly feel the excitement building as the April 20, 21 and 22 SGS Convention and Show rapidly approaches. We have received numerous cards and letters from members planning to attend for the first time. In fact, it appears that this may be one of our biggest shows ever! We have been busy checking out our boxes of extras for trade or sale and we have, reluctantly, had to go through our collection on display to "weed" out those pieces which we no longer need. As time goes on and our collection expands, we find that we have duplicates in colors which are not our "favorites" so we can pass them on to other collectors which prefer that color.

We are also beginning our annual debate as to what to bring for display. We really liked the 1993 Show with its theme of red stretch. We are proposing that this year we, as a society, try to put on a general display of stretch glass lines and colors.

If you refer to the January 1994 Newsletter, Berry Wiggins had a listing of stretch glass line names and colors. We will be bringing labels for all of the lines and colors in that list. However, we hope that members can bring some of the pieces which we don't have.

In Central: we need blue (we know of a cobalt blue candle stick set), purple and topaz. In Diamond: we have an example of the blue crackled (cobalt blue glass with heavy iridescence which crackled the glass) but wonder if anyone may have an example of the amethyst crackled or pearl crackled. We also need an example of the 'After Glow', the Diamond pink. In Fenton: we can probably get all the colors unless you think you have something unique. We'll bring an example of Fenton's cobalt blue and light amber. Imperial: does anyone have an example of their emerald green and black? In Jeannette: we will bring an example of their 'gold' and 'purple' but we need an example of their amber, green and white. In Lancaster: we

have most of the painted colors (green, white and red) but could someone bring an example of their 'iris ice' and 'rose ice' (pearl and heavy marigold)? Northwood we have the common colors but we would need examples of emerald green, opaque white, royal purple and some of the odd colors seen in the 'tree-oflife' footed bowls. In U.S. Glass: we need examples of the 'Cumula' (cloud enameled), 'Pomona' (leaf enameled, in various colors), opaque red, opaque pink, pearl blue (light blue slag), and ruby. In Vineland we need an example of their pink, emerald green and caramel slag. If you think that you have one or more of these pieces, please send us a card so we can check them off the list of needs. Likewise, if you think that you have some unique pieces for this display, bring them along!

For people attending for the first time, don't feel that you have nothing to share. We remember our first show in 1990 when we thought that we wouldn't have anything anyone else would be interested in. How wrong we were! We had several pieces which the "old timers" had never seen before. At each show since, this has happened time and time again. And, if you have a piece which has been difficult to identify, the show is the place to get it identified.

Concerning Society business, we were recently informed by Mildred Bicksler that she wishes to step down from the Secretary-Newsletter Editor this year. As you well know, Mildred has performed outstanding service to our Society and her expertise and talents will be hard to replace. In any case, we must face the fact that we need a person who is willing and able to perform the difficult tasks needed. The SGS Sec-Editor must be able to type or use a word processor, locate a printer (photocopy service), and be sure that the newsletter is properly labelled and sent out on time. The editor doesn't have to write all of the material, but must be willing to solicit comments, articles, sale and want lists, business meeting minutes and similar items. We certainly hope that some willing soul volunteers before the officers have to "go on the hunt."

We must also announce that two members of our Board of Directors have terms expiring this year; Rose Schleede (normal term) and Joanne Rodgers (appointed to complete John Madeley's term vacated when he became VP). We hope that Rose and Joanne will be willing to serve again but these positions are open to any member in good standing. Let any officer know if you're interested. The nominations committee will be considering all interested possibilities during the Convention and Show before our business meeting.

Cal recently sent out a letter reminding everyone about the payment of dues. We appreciate early attention to this little task though the treasurer can take dues during set times at the Convention and Show. Remember that Cal likes to look at the displays too!

Some new members have asked where the nearest airports to New Philadelphia are. At first, I thought that Cleveland (85 mi) and Columbus (120 mi) were the closest, but after looking at a map, the Pirtsburgh, PA airport is certainly the closest. Pittsburgh is also a hub for USAir. If you flyto Pittsburgh, go SW on PA60 to US22 west, then in Ohio take US250 to New Philadelphia (and 177 exit 81). From Cleveland, take 171 south to exit 218, OH18 east to 175, 175 to 1277 around Akron, and 175 south to exit 81. From Columbus, take 170 east to 175 north to exit 81.

Again, we ask that you make your motel reservations as soon as possible and remember to let us know if you will not be able to come in until Friday or Saturday, especially if you want some display table space. Space may be at a premium but we will save some. Send us a card or call if you want us to save some display space or you will be late arriving but will be attending our Saturday banquet.

In this newsletter, we have also enclosed a copy of the poster which we have placed in shops near our Convention and Show. If you have some local shows, glass clubs and the like, feel free to make copies of this poster and distribute them. We hope that you like the logos on the poster. SEE YOU SOON!




8 3/4-inch Berry Bowl, Regular (ground foot, 3-inch outside diameter)




9 1/4-inch Berry Bowl, Regular (ground foot, 3 5/8-inch outside diameter)




9 1/4-inch Low Foot Comport (base 4 1/4-inch in diameter)




8 1/4-inch Low Foot Comport (base 3 1/2-inch in diameter)

6-inch Low Foot Comport, Flared (base 3 1/5-inch in diameter)




4 1/4-inch Sundae (base 2 3/4-inch in diameter)


The berry bowls are most common in blue and amber though pearl, opaque yellow and opaque green are fairly common. The berry bowls may also be found with the rims rolled out or cupped in. The comports were drawn from opaque yellow and green examples though we also have the sundae in amber which has been greatly flared out so the rays are difficult to see.










The original of this delightful fanshaped glass vase, now in the Museum's collection, was made by Fenton Art Glass of Williamstown, West Virginia, in about 1927.


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


