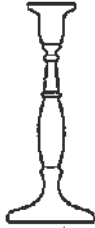

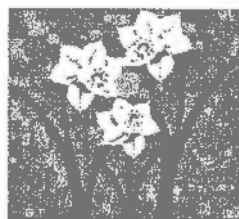
She has put on invisibility

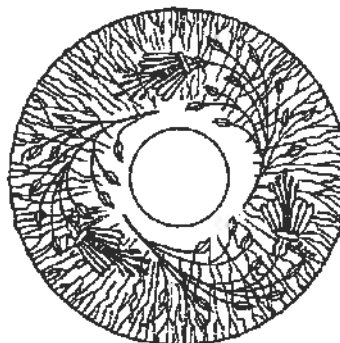
IN THE CARNIVAL GLASS HALL OF FAME

Rose Schleede and her husband, Carl, are members of the Carnival Glass Hall of Fame. This Hall of Fame is a function of the American Carnival Glass Association. Carl was an early Vice-President of the ACGA and later President of the ACGA. He was instrumental in getting protection of the Northwood trademarks. No glass manufacturer in the US can use the Northwood trademarks. There have been lawsuits over the "N" mark. These lawsuits were won by the ACGA.

Rose and Carl were wonderful people. Their displays at convention were always a sight to see. Carl died several years ago and now Rose is gone. What wonderful memories they have left behind! Wonderful people seem to do this. Eunice and I send condolences to the Schleede family. If you didn't know Carl and Rose, you missed knowing two great people. Rose told us once that they stopped at every garage sale, yard sale, flea market, etc. Lots of stops helped make a wonderful collection.

From the Editor's Desk: Jan Reichling



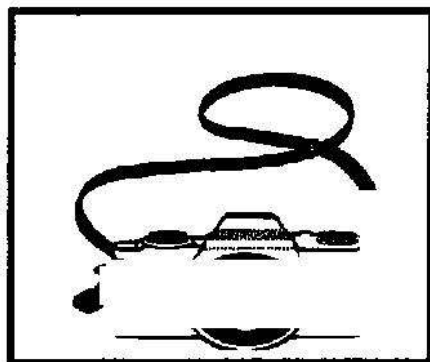

Featuring: Fenton Stretch Glass

I had asked John Madeley if he would do a composition on "melon ribbed" Stretch Glass made by the Fenton Art Glass Company (a name often referred to for these shapes by other collectors, but not necessarily found in any publications or indicated as such by the manufacturer — as far as we know) . I am amazed at the variety of shapes that were manufactured from these two molds. As you view the pictures, think of all the colors and shapes in this style alone and you could have a collection of just "melon ribbed" Stretch Glass. The two molds

represented by the numbers 847 and 857 can be thought of as small (847) and large (857). The Velva Rose #857 9 1/2" Deep Bowl and the bottom of the Velva Rose #844 Candy are of the same style but different sizes. The #844 Candy was a mold of it's own and came with the lid. The Lavender Fan Vase, the Aquamarine Shell Shaped Vase, the Aquamarine Banana Bowl, the Velva Rose Covered Candy , the Velva Rose Deep Bowl, and the Tangerine Cupped Bowl are more difficult to find. The Fan Vases were produced in two sizes, 6 inch and 8 inch in the Fenton colors of Persian Pearl, Topaz, Aquamarine, Velva Rose, Tangerine, Florentine Green, Celeste Blue, and Lavender. The "look" of the individual pieces changes dramatically whether they are shaped in (ex: cupped or rolled) or out (ex: flared or rolled) Not all the shapes have been included, but hopefully this composition will provide you with a basis for your search of "melon ribbed" Stretch Glass. **Enjoy!!**
