Stretch Glass Collection Update**

The Bill Crawl Memorial Education Fund Stretch Glass Collection (The Collection) has grown rapidly over the past 18 months. Our auctioneer friends have been bringing stretch glass to market at a record pace and we have been able to acquire a number of examples of stretch glass for The Collection. In November, Dave and Renée Shetlar visited Jeff and me for a few days. I had unpacked The Collection and Dave and I photographed each piece as well as a few groups of items. It is our intention to share these photos with you in subsequent issues of The Quarterly, to allow you to see how The Collection is growing as a result of your generous giving. Bill Crawl would surely be proud of The Collection, although I'm sure he would like to see us add more "rare" stretch glass. As of mid-November, 2022, The Collection contains over 400 examples of stretch glass ranging from nut cups to the 17" Fenton Ruby #604 Salver, which was our initial purchase. Many of the colors in which stretch glass were produced are represented as are many of the shapes. The Collection includes stretch glass from each of the nine companies which made stretch glass, including a few examples of Jeannette, Lancaster, Central and Diamond to go with our more robust selection of Fenton, Imperial, Northwood, US Glass and Vineland stretch glass. We welcome all donations of stretch glass, whether it is one piece or many pieces and we thank all of our donors who have helped to make this a truly wonderful collection.

These photos show how the Oxford Bobeche was used. This celeste blue Bobeche, also found in white and marigold, is attached to an electric lighting fixture. So searching for a candleholder to fit with this piece of glass may prove fruitless. Of course the photos show an incomplete fixture. It appears to be missing the light socket and wiring plus the switch that would come out the oval slot on the side. There are three screws to fix the Bobeche to the fixture. I thought sharing this find may help those of us who thought these were only used to control candle wax drippings. If anyone has any other information on these please contact me at [REDACTED]. Stretch Glass Baskets – Original & Recent II

Since my first discussion on stretch glass baskets (June 2020), I've accumulated many more images and examples of the Fenton late-production baskets (from 1980 until their closing), so I thought it would be interesting to discuss some of these pieces. While many of the late-production baskets were placed in Fenton's general lines and are illustrated in their annual catalogs, many were special items made for QVC or were designated as other special lines that were only sold through distributors or other outlets.



The first two baskets are actually vintage pieces. Another of the "crackle" surface corset-shaped baskets by Diamond has surfaced in a marigold (Fig. 1). I also finally got images of an Imperial basket #300 ("plain Jane") in a true Rose Ice (Fig. 2). Most of these baskets have shiny iridescence.

I've been able to identify most of the late-production Fenton numbers, but some are still to be identified. These late-production numbers are entirely different than the original numbers even when the old mold was used. Most of the late-production numbers are a four-digit number followed with a two digit/alphabetic identification that is unique for each color and/or surface treatment (i.e., iridized or not, decorated or not). The four-digit numbers identify the shape and form of the piece and seems to have no relationship to the mold being used. In other words, a lily-shaped crimp will have a different number than a square-shaped crimp.

The first grouping of baskets appear to have used the old mold used to make Fenton's #835 candy jars and vases (Figs. 3-6). The modern number is #5937 when the top treatment is in the "lily" form. The ones shown are: Celeste Blue (with decoration), Autumn Gold Stretch (with decoration), Sunset Satin, and Violet Stretch (with decoration). This basket is also known in Ruby-amberina stretch. The next grouping of baskets appear to have been made from the Fenton "melon rib" #847 bowl mold (Figs. 7-11). The modern number is #7536 when the square-shaped bowl is used. In order, the baskets are in: Willow Green Opalescent Stretch, Cobalt Blue Stretch (appears to be an experimental piece), Ruby-amberina Stretch (with a ruby handle), Ruby-amberina Stretch (with a milk glass handle, likely a whimsey), and Velva Rose. Notice that the Cobalt Blue and Velva Rose baskets have plain handles while the others have square-twist handles.

The next group of baskets all have optic ribs but notice that there are subtle differences! Baskets in Figs. 12 & 13 have base diameters a bit smaller than the baskets in Figs. 14-16. The baskets in Figs. 17 & 18 have slighter wider ribs and a constricting ring before the base. The first two have square tops and are designated as #2787. They are in Autumn Gold Stretch (with paint decoration) and Stiegel Green (with coralene decoration, made up of small glass beads). The three wide-base baskets with lily tops are #5430 in: Celeste Blue, Violet Stretch and Ruby-amberina Stretch. The last two baskets are #5931 in Autumn Gold Stretch and Sunset Stretch.

Next are some footed baskets. A three-footed basket with drapery design and a double-pie crust crimped edge (#5739) is fairly obtainable in Violet Stretch (Fig. 19) and in the Aquamarine Opalescent Stretch (shown in the 2020 article). The three-footed, diamond optic interior and rings exterior basket (Fig. 20) is a SGS whimsey made in 2003 in Topaz Opalescent Stretch. This basket was made with the same mold that was used to make the Levay Purple Stretch Basket (Fig. 24) that has a fine crimped, oval top (#8435). I really like another footed basket that has an external shell-shaped, repeating design with double crimped edges (Figs. 21 & 22). This is #6539 and is shown in Aubergine Stretch and Ruby-amberina Stretch. This basket also comes in Sunset Stretch (pink, not shown).



A large basket that appears to be a whimsey made from a ruby stretch "Acanthus" plate recently appeared in a stretch glass auction (Fig. 23). The corset-shaped, blown vase was used to make #3131 vase in Apple Green Stretch with a Purple Crest (Fig. 25). This appears to be a QVC item, but it often shows up on eBay. The Aquamarine Opalescent Stretch basket (Fig. 26) has exterior ribs and I had a difficult time tracking down its number as #C6630 9N which was another QVC item. Two baskets have a design that looks very similar to the paired rays of the U.S. Glass 310 line, Figs. 27 & 34. Again, I had considerable difficulty tracking down this basket but they turned out to be #C1120 QVC items. The pink one is actually Rosemilk Opalescent Stretch (with paint decoration) and the bluish one is Aquamarine Opalescent Stretch with a Violet crest.

I showed several miniature stretch baskets in my earlier article and since then I found another one (Fig. 28). It has a series of knobs for the base and is #6949 in Ruby-amberina Stretch. Some other baskets have optic panels which can be mistaken for the narrow panels (Figs. 29 & 30). The purple one is #2777 in Violet Stretch with floral decoration, and it has the lily-form top. I thought that I had found the same basket in Ruby but when you look at the base, you'll see that the base of Fig. 30 is much wider than the Fig. 29 basket! The wider-based basket is #4234. The "wild flower" intaglio mold (intaglio means that the design goes into the glass, not standing out from the glass) was used to make the two baskets in Figs. 31 & 32, but because of the differences in top treatments, they have two numbers, #2835 & #2837. The green one is in Apple Green Stretch and the pink one is Sunset Satin. The final small basket (Fig. 33) used the same mold that was used to make the SGS 2007 club piece (a three sides up, or tri-corner vase). It is #4198 and is in Ruby-amberina Stretch with a floral decoration.



Fenton obviously placed a lot of effort in creating baskets in their final years and there are more that I haven't illustrated yet and likely more to be discovered. Keep looking!

Auction Updates

Burns Auction of stretch glass at our 2022 Convention & Show was certainly a fun event and many of us went home with new additions for our collections. Auction fun continued into September, October and November (I'm writing this as of Nov 23) with Burns Auctions, Matthew Wroda Auctions and Sheffield Auctions bring varying amounts of stretch glass to market.

Matthew Wroda Auctions held a stretch glass auction in conjunction with the New England Carnival Glass Association's Convention on September 8, 2022. I was fortunate to be able to attend in person. The auction featured nearly 100 lots of stretch glass, some of which were quite unusual. At the top of the bidding was \$850 for very large Imperial Smooth Panels Iris Ice Vase, \$525 for a blue Diamond Adams Rib Pitcher, \$425 for an Imperial Chesterfield Green Ice Pitcher, \$245 for a Fenton

Persian Pearl Heavy Pineapple 4 flared bowl with stretch effect, \$215 for a Fenton Amber Heavy Pineapple flared bowl with an unusual combination of stretch and carnival finish and lots more. This auction offered a wide range of candleholders in 26 lots, both singles and pairs, which were hammered down from \$145 to \$10 per lot. There were bargains to be had for those

looking for candleholders. Also offered were a selection of 8 swans which sold between \$90 and \$5 each. There were 12 vases, including the previously mentioned Imperial Smooth Panels one. Exclusive of that vase, the others sold between \$225 and \$25

each. Rounding out the auction were ashtrays, baskets, bonbons, bowls, a cologne, comports, 2 late period epergnes, 3 guest sets, 3 mini items made for LeVay, Wistaria and Velva Rose nut cups, a pen holder, plates, an Imperial Ruby Ice sugar & creamer set (\$85), a tumble up, and an unusual blue punch cup with interior ribs (\$130) the maker of which is yet to be identified. All in all, a nice selection. Several

members of The Stretch Glass Society were in attendance or bidding on-line and were purchasers of much of the stretch glass.



On October 20, 2022, Burns Auction Service offered nearly 175 lots of stretch glass during the Mid-Atlantic Carnival Glass Convention. I was also able to attend this auction in person and a number of other stretch glass enthusiasts were on hand for the lively bidding. The Burns auction featured more black bases than we have seen recently, a total of 16 lots, many with more than one base. The lots sold for an average of just under \$29, from a high of \$40 to a low of \$10. There were a multitude of bowls offered for sale ranging from the very rare Northwood Opaque White with black decoration example (\$1500) to a cupped Imperial Green Ice Floral & Optic (\$170), a Diamond Egyptian Lustre (\$165), a topaz Fenton 8-sided salad serving with Laurel Leaf edge (\$150) and many others selling at prices from \$15 to \$90 each. This auction also featured 25 lots of candleholders, mostly pairs. These included the Fenton #249s (\$320), Diamond Wisteria 'Columns' (\$150), Northwood tall, square (\$110) and two pair

of Vineland Amethyst 'colonial' examples which sold for \$100 and \$45. A hard to find crystal Diamond car vase with pinched top sold for \$100, 16 fan vases, some with dolphin handles, sold for an average of \$20 each. An Imperial Pearl Amethyst hair receiver brought \$170. Four topaz nut cups were hammered down at \$100 for the set while a Blue Ice Imperial cheese and cracker with wheel cutting realized \$150. Among the many vases (20 in all), an Aquamarine Fenton 'Ring' vase brought \$700, a Royal Purple Northwood #618 vase realized \$325, a similar blue Northwood vase was hammered down at \$235 and a green Diamond flared vase with matchstick cutting sold at \$290. Also included in the auction were a basket, butterball tray, candlebowl, center handled servers, a cigarette holder, comports, several examples of Imperial Jewels, plates, a powder puff, 2 salts, several sherbets,



2 sets of sugar & creamers, tumblers and a tumble up. Once again, Burns Auction Service brought a nice selection of stretch glass to auction for stretch glass enthusiasts.

Sheffield Auctions offered several pieces of stretch glass among their predominately carnival glass auctions. We look forward to them bringing us an auction of predominately stretch glass – maybe in 2023? All of these and many more auctions containing stretch glass can be viewed in their entirety on the auctioneers' websites or on HiBid by clicking on 'previous auctions.' Auction results are also posted to the Hooked on Carnival (and Stretch) glass pricing tool (<https://www.hookedoncarnival.com/pricingindex.php>) where they can be viewed in connection with other sales of similar items. We are grateful to our auctioneer friends for searching out stretch glass for us and to the volunteers who keep the pricing tool up to date. Please watch the auctioneers' websites for upcoming auctions and support them by bidding.

Eastern National Antique Show & Sale

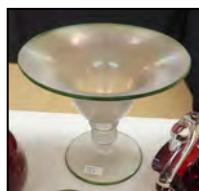

The Stretch Glass Society continues to follow one of its prime directives stated in our Constitution and By-laws, that is, to promote the study and interest in iridescent stretch glass. We try to reach additional people through our Stretch Glass Society Facebook page (<https://www.facebook.com/groups/221334884993661>) where we have slightly more than 900 members. Since we have only about 160 society members, this means that we have quite a few other followers. Several on the SGS Board monitor our FB page and we try to respond to new postings quickly. It's fun to see member's new purchases and others asking for assistance in identifying stretch glass. Of course, we often get some postings of art glass and swung vases, but that simply provides the education opportunity to describe what iridescent stretch glass is.

Over the last couple of months, I've also provided links to YouTube videos that show the making of some of our SGS Convention souvenir pieces, and I have several more to post. If you haven't seen stretch glass made, it's pretty fascinating. I will also periodically post some information on specific pieces that I find interesting, and I encourage all of you to participate by posting information or pictures of similar pieces in your collections.

I want to give "kudos" to our other board members and "Brian, the Web Master" for their outreach efforts. All of us work in concert to try and provide you with one of the best newsletters found in the glass collecting sphere, an excellent web site that is constantly updated with new postings of information, and regular Zoom Stretch Out calls.

In a recent board meeting, there was considerable discussion about how we could do more outreach efforts. We have investigated using Instagram, Twitter and even TikTok (I mentioned that I refused to do a dance with stretch glass!) to spread the word about stretch glass. I've investigated all these platforms and I'm even more convinced that Facebook is still the best for us to use. However, I believe that we can use FB even better, but it will take each of you to assist. Many of you have friends on FB that may or may not have your "collector's syndrome." But, I'll bet that you have FB friends that ARE collectors! If you continue to like, link or repost some of the discussions found on our FB site, you will help us to capture additional folks who may not be aware of our activities.
