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

Our outreach program begins with you, the members of the Stretch Glass Society...each and everyone one of you. While the Board of Directors and Officers will lead the program, I ask each of you to get involved, do something to raise the level of awareness about iridescent stretch glass in your local area and create enthusiasm for our glass. How can you help? I am so glad you asked. We are launching a campaign to contact hundreds, maybe thousands, of other collectors, who we believe might be, or might want to be (given the chance), iridescent stretch glass enthusiasts. We may ask you to help stuff some envelopes with information about iridescent stretch glass; we need to know of your local antique/collectible-related publications which we may contact with news and information about our Society and glass, we will be asking you to look for opportunities to display or show some of your iridescent stretch glass so that others may see how beautiful it is and there will be more. Everyone can be involved in getting the word out about iridescent stretch glass whether it be by putting up a display in your local library, recruiting a new member, giving a talk, answering questions for a reporter, taking a few pieces to the Antique Road Show or just stopping to talk to the dealer with the blue bowl or bon bon at the local flea market to make sure she/he knows what they are selling and has an opportunity to join the Stretch Glass Society. More details follow elsewhere In the newsletter; please let us know what you are doing so we may highlight all our members' activities in the next newsletters.

Please welcome two new members to the leadership team: Stephanie Leonard of Massachusetts joins us as Vice President. Stephanie concentrates on Celeste Blue iridescent stretch glass and will be leading our efforts to expand and retain our members. Sharon Mizell of Maryland, joins us as Director for Advertising and Promotion. Sharon collects Topaz indescent stretch glass and is fast becoming one of the leading dealers offering our glass for sale. Sharon will be coordinating our outreach program to dealers, antique mall and shop owners, the media, other clubs and more. We are also pleased to have Helen Jones continuing in the leadership position of Webmaster. Helen and her husband, Bob, specialize in cups and saucers. including iridescent stretch glass ones and also buy and sell our glass whenever they can find it. These members, along with Joanne Rodgers, who was re-elected Director of Conventions, join the remaining members of the Board who are in the middle of their 2-year terms. As you can see, we have a full Board of Directors with lots of energy and enthusiasm. The Board of Directors will be meeting via teleconference monthly as we roll out the outreach program, plan for the 30th anniversary 2004 annual convention, show and sale, select the next Club souvenir piece and continue to promote our glass and interest in it.

# Remarkable Glass! at the 2003 SGS Convention and Show

**News/Technical Information** 

ach year, I can't wait to see what our members bring to our show! Every time I believe that I've seen it all, items show up that may be entirely new to me while many others are known pieces, but in different colors or shapes. Our 2003 convention certainly lived up to that anticipation. I've only picked a small number of interesting and unusual items for this newsletter and I include more of these items in some of the future newsletters.

Our Club Display was of stretch glass in pastels, so Cal Hackernan brought—for his personal display—his collection of Diamond Egyptian Lustre as a contrast. From the small to the large, he had a small 7e-inch diameter bowl which was made from the same 3½-inch based plate illustrated in the stretch glass book (plate 48). At the large end of the scale was a monster 12-inch diameter bowl with a 5-inch base. This is the same bowl shown in blue (plate 30) in "the" book. Cal also displayed his 14-inch diameter low bowl with exceptional gold and white enamel decoration. The glass handlers must have arms like Popeye in order to be able to manipulate these pieces in the snaps!

Of greatest interest to me was a low bowl with what appeared to be three applied feet and a pontil. When I first saw it, I thought that Cal had made a mistake in including a piece of art glass! However, upon close inspection, the feet were molded and the ground area was actually a ground marie (a small knob which was used to hold the piece during shaping and application of the iridescent spray). The mold that was used to make the blue bowl figured in plate 29 appears to be the origin of this black bowl as well. This bowl could easily be mistaken for a true art glass piece since there no classical mold marks present! I suspect that Diamond used a shell mold to make this piece. In shell molds, the base is one piece of steel and the mold is turned upside down to drop out the molded glass.

Tom and Sandy Monoski brought a great variety of items, including several cross-over pieces that carnival collectors would "claim as theirs" (I'll show those later). couldn't believe my eyes when they unwrapped a perfect example of the Fenton #844 covered bonbon with the flower top knob. Tom mentioned that the seller had stated that the top wasn't iridized very well, but that is typical of these pieces! Without reshaping, the classical stretch effect is not developed. They also brought a Fenton #1504A, tripledolphin bowl (10cf-inch wide) in AMBER. Renée and I had tried to bid on this piece on eBay, but we couldn't scrape up enough cash for such a desirable piece! We thought that it may have been a piece of weak tangerine. It was great to see this very uncommon color from Fenton. We have only seen some medium sized bowls in Amber stretch glass from Fenton.

Tom and Sandy also showed up with an Imperial 111/2-Inch tall vase in "smoke-on-milk!" When I picked up the

piece, it was as light as a feather! Even Howard Seufer (the former Fenton quality control officer who has given us two banquet talks) mentioned that Imperial had worked hard to make such a delicate piece. Monoski's Fenton Ruby "cut ovals" console set consisted of a 91/4-Inch #607 bowl and #369 candleholders. In the Fenton catalog pages, they normally paired the #647 flared and cupped bowl with the 10-inch candleholders. Their Fenton #604 bowl in Wisteria was a whopping 13-inches in diameter. These bowls are usually simply flared, punch bowls, or occasionally crimped. Two other rare treatments from the #604 mold is the 14-inch low bowl (plate 115) and 16 to 18-inch plate (plate 201). Tom and Sandy also displayed a U.S. Glass #310 low footed comport with the open work rim cupped up. The other pieces that I've seen of this form have the rim straight out or rolled down. While there were some minor cracks in the open work area, it was an outstanding exhibit piece.

Bill Crowl brought several pleces for display including TWO imperial sugar and creamer sets! The set with decail decoration, and an underplate, is in the book (plate 431), but Bill had an additional set without the plate and no decoration. We had some long and hard negotiations with Bill since we had found a creamer and plate without decoration a couple of years ago! Bill also displayed a U.S. Glass handled server with the Cumula enamel decoration. I noticed that many of our members tried to talk him out of this plece, but he insisted that it was "part of his collection." On his sale table, I spotted a difficult- to-find U.S. Glass mayonnaise dish in amber. This one has the optic rays and points which is the line that we have yet to identify.

For the pastels club display, three unusual mayonnaise sets showed up WiTH ladles! Joanne Rodgers displayed an Imperial octagonal set in pink with decal decoration and gold accent paint. Of special interest was the complementary ladle which had been given a satin treatment yet still had the decal decoration. This made for a very pleasing contrast in the set. Cal showed a U.S. Glass mayo and ladle with the Cumula decoration. Even the small ladle had the enamel design! I wasn't sure that the interior of the ladle was iridized, though we know of pink and green U.S. Glass tadles that are iridized. Jim Steinbach had been lucky enough to find a Lancaster mayo set with a matching enameled ladle! In this case, it was evident that the ladle was not iridized.

During one of our discussion periods, I noticed that Sharon Mizell had an 8-inch tall Diamond vase which is commonly confused with Fenton's vases of the same size. From the pictures, you should be able to see that the Diamond vase has a thick layer of glass in the bottom while the Fenton one is thin. The Diamond vase also has a true snap bottom with a collar, but the Fenton vase only has a rounded base. If you look inside the bottoms, the Diamond vase had a definite hollowed area, while the Fenton vase is nearly flat across the entire bottom—now, check your vases to see which ones you have!

Hope these pieces spur you on in your search for additional interesting pieces of indescent stretch glass! Great pieces show up in all kinds of places and you simply have to be on the look out for them! Good hunting!







#### A Few Words From....

So I'm doubly grateful that Cal, our new President, Sharon, our new Director of Advertising/Promotion and our entire Executive Board are working together on a promotional campaign for increased membership this year. We need a larger critical mass of members to continue the business of our society.

Thinking of promoting the benefits of membership to others makes me remember why I joined and what the Stretch Glass Society has meant to me. I'm sure that all of us have similar stories.

When I joined in 1991, I was the only person I knew who collected stretch glass, and I had only a few pieces. Through Berry Wiggins' book, I found Berry and was introduced to and welcomed warmly by the club. Since then, in the newsletters and at convention, I've seen more beautiful glass, learned more about its' manufacture and identification, and found more friends who share my passion than I could have by myself. I'm proud to tell others that I belong to the Stretch Glass Society and to show off our newsletters and website. There are still collectors out there who don't know about our Society and would like to join If they did. And there are potential collectors who have inherited or bought a couple of pieces of stretch glass without knowing what it is. In order to educate and entice these folks, Dave Shetlar has put together a 1-page, 2-sided fridescent Stretch Glass information sheet. It has beautiful pictures and loads of information, including the website. It will be available to all members to display at shows, in malls, or at clubs in your area.

I'm working with Sharon to develop a prospecting database of contacts, so that we don't duplicate efforts. I'm creating mailing labels for other glass clubs, museum curators, and auctioneers. We'll send them the information sheet, a membership form for joining SGS, and a cover letter from me about the benefits of membership. n April 14th, Joanne Rodgers presented a program on iridescent stretch glass to the Samplers, an antiques/collector

club in Brecksville, Ohio. Here Is her report.

Do you know if Fenton dld a 75th Anniversary piece of glass in this cupped tulip-bowl shape?

Reply: I took a look at the bowl and it looks just like those still available in the Fenton gift shop. To my knowledge, these were produced in the 20's, but NOT cupped. I don't think they were produced for the 75th anniversary either. I would wager that this is a new piece produced the last year or so because the "oval" does not always come out cleanly from the mold and from the photo, the piece looks as thick as those I've seen in the alft shop.

Hard to swear to this without actually handling it, but that would certainly be my guess. Renée



Dave & Renee: I hope that you are rested after the convention! I look forward to hearing about it in the

newsletter. Did you take the Imperial, decorated server you bought off of Ebay with you to the convention? Were you able to identify the color as yet?



I just thought I'd pass along that I finally got my Northwood #651 candlesticks! I got them through Ebay and even though they indicated that there wasn't any damage, I did find a tiny ding on an edge near the top but it is on a lower portion so you can't see it unless you really search for it. I'm not worried about it because the iridescence is the best I have ever seen on these sticks. I realized that I had forgotten how truly beautiful these sticks really are. They're heavy and have such a great design.

I've always wondered why they designed them square and not have a

complimentary bowl to go with them. The tree bark, square bases obviously go with them but the bowls are far too low compared to the size of these candlesticks! Having candles

in them with one of those bowls would look unbalanced. Any thoughts on this? I have them next to my Dugan, Adam's Rib compote like in your plate #37. The blue of the compote matches very well to the blue of the sticks. Diamond Glass-ware "Adam's The height of the compote also Rib" comport



goes well with them.

Did you see the Fenton 220 lemonade set with the etching for sale on Ebay? Unfortunately It is not iridized!

Imperial server #725 about it. It got lots of attention by




all the other attendees though. [The base color is unidentified and resembles Fenton's aquamarine].
