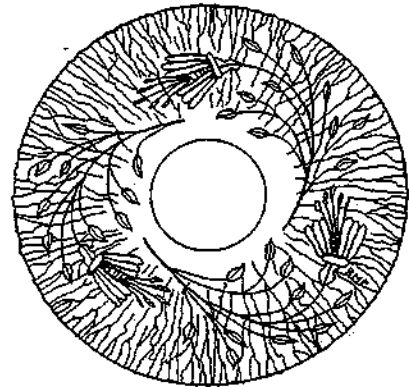

(CO-) PRESIDENTS' MESSAGE



Dear Members: OUR APOLOGIES! It's our fault that your newsletter is so late! We wanted to let you all get an early look at the beautiful SGS 2000 stretch glass pieces. After some "technical difficulties," we were finally able to get the pictures mocked up on our color page. Without a specialty photo shop that can print the too small sizes, we had to go to digital! Enough said!

Anyway, **HAPPY NEW MILLENNIUM!** What a nice long (16 day) break we had during the holidays! Hope you all had good times with family and friends and were able to use some of the time off to hunt stretch! We didn't get to "shop" very much during our trip to Florida, though we found a few pieces in the few places we looked.

Our sole find for the trip down was a U.S. Glass bowl (probably #179) in Pearl Blue. The iridescence is very faint, but the piece makes a really nice research specimen. With grandkids in hand, we ventured into a few shops to and from Disney World and came up with a nice 9-inch Pearl Ruby (Imperial #83) crimped vase and a Fenton 6-inch (#756) octagon, Laurel Leaf plate in Topaz. On our way home, we found two more pieces in Knoxville, Tennessee – a Northwood #646 flattened card tray in Jade Blue and an Imperial round, optic, wide panel bowl in Iris Ice. Both the Imperial pieces have the old "Iron Cross" marks, too!

We also got a couple of pieces through the Internet auction site, eBay, before the trip. One was a small Imperial bonbon (#64) in Pearl Amethyst and the other was the smaller version of the U.S. Glass high-footed, wide flared comport (see Plate 686 in The Book) in opaque yellow.

Okay, now it's your turn! Let us know what you are finding in your quests for those increasingly elusive Stretch glass treasures. What do you buy (if anything) when you CAN'T find Stretch that you just have to have? Do you have a list of pieces that you need for completing a set, or for filling out your grouping of colors or shapes? Come on, send us your "want" list and we'll get as much of it as we can into our Seekers 'N Sellers section of the Newsletter. Yes, Virginia, there may still be a Santa and you never know when he/she may have just what you're looking for!

While you're at it, why don't you pack up some of those extras you've got and bring them to the SGS convention to sell or trade? Just remember, we're pretty sophisticated collectors, so be sure to select some of your best! This year's convention in Marietta, Ohio is just around the corner and you're sure to want to participate. Look for more information elsewhere in this issue.

This is a momentous year! Yes, of course, it's a new Millennium, but we're not referring to *that*! This is the year that will live in our memories for many years to come. It is the year that we, the first Co-Presidents of the Stretch Glass Society, step down from serving five, two-year terms! It's not that we haven't enjoyed our reign; it's just that it has lasted way too long. We now know what our military veterans mean when they say they suffer from battle fatigue! Just kidding, of course! But, please read and think about our thoughts on this topic.

We have lost many wonderful friends and Society supporters to the "great beyond" during our tenure and we continue to think about them and miss them. We realize that some of our older members are finding it more and more difficult to get to our meetings and participate in the needs of the Society. Some have family members that have developed interest in stretch glass and these become welcome additions to our "family," but we must all face the fact that they (and us) will not live forever. We must all continue to strive to interest "new blood," especially younger people, in our glass.

We believe that one of the best ways to accomplish this task is to actively show off your stretch glass. Have you invited people that have the "collecting syndrome" to your home to view your collection? Do you belong to other glass clubs or collecting clubs and have you volunteered to show your glass? We know that this can be a disturbing thought for many of you that have fear of public speaking, or more importantly, are fearful of theft.

You can find ways to overcome or avoid fear of public speaking. Make displays that have numerous tags or cards that explain what is being seen. Instead of a formal talk from a podium, try using a table full of glass and simply pick the pieces up and describe what you see and what is interesting to you. One of your greatest fears may be that you "might make a mistake" about the identity of the pieces. There is nothing wrong with saying "I THINK that this piece is a so and so, but I haven't had a chance to check it out with one of our experts."

Fear of bringing essentially strangers into your home is even more difficult for some to overcome. With our general mistrust of strangers and news reports emphasizing acts of increasing violence, theft and senseless murders, this fear is easy to understand. There was an interesting discussion of this problem on the WWW Carnival Glass Site this fall. Most of the experienced collectors claimed that they had little or no fear of having visitors, especially ones that they had come to know through the Internet, or through other friends and collecting acquaintances that vouched for the unknown persons. National statistics suggest that you are MUCH more likely to be robbed by someone who randomly picks your home in hopes of finding cash or items easily converted to cash. We are much more likely to have our glass smashed than stolen! Antique dealers that have been robbed are usually targeted as they load, unload or park their van or truck full of goods at a known location. However, even these cases are rare occurrences.

Our final thoughts concern whether the Stretch Glass Society will survive this new decade! As stated above, we are tired of being Co-Presidents and wish to do other things. We are still very interested in working with the SGS and we are currently interested in relieving Jan to help put together our newsletter and perform the other secretarial duties. Like Jan, Mildred Bicksler, and Mary Louise Ryan (the most immediate past secretaries), we don't plan to do this for life! However, we think we will be interested in doing these duties for a term or two. This "tendency" of the Stretch Glass Society to have "officers for life" will simply exhaust those members willing to put in some extra time and effort. Some of our currently exhausted officers are even talking about stopping collecting all together!

This brings us to the real problem! WHO will be president (or co-presidents)? We have asked, begged and pleaded with many that we believe would be good officers and they have replied with a definite "NO!" or "I would, but just don't have time now." At this point, we are asking whether SGS can be run without a president!? Folks, this job is not that difficult! It takes some time and you have to be willing to keep asking the other officers, directors and convention manager whether they are on schedule or not. If you don't want to write the president's message for the newsletter - we'll ghost write one for you! We're all busy, overworked, have too many family members to deal with, etc., etc., etc. We need one of you to step forward and help the Society. If not, then perhaps the SGS has outlived its usefulness and the only recourse is to disband!!

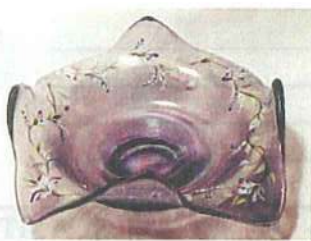

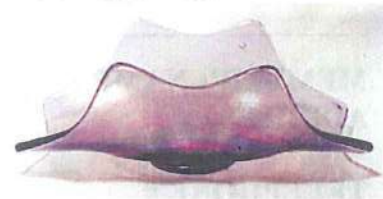

2000 WHIMSEY AUCTION

The Stretch Glass Society is proud to present the 2000 Convention and Show Whimsey Auction. This year The Society will be auctioning 15 wonderful Fenton made whimsies at its annual convention and show. 11 of these whimsies were produced in January using a *red* colored glass in a Fenton rib optic comport mold. 4 of the pieces were produced last year in *violet* colored glass using a Fenton tulip bowl mold. This live auction will be conducted on Saturday May 6, 2000, immediately following The Societies 9:00 AM business meeting at The Lafayette Hotel in Marietta, Ohio. Each piece will have a reserve (minimum) price and will be sold to the highest bidder. All proceeds from the auction will be used for the continued operation of The Society. Bidding will be limited to current members of The Stretch Glass Society. For those members who will be unable to attend the auction, absentee bids will be accepted. For those members interested in submitting an absentee bid, please refer to the following instructions. Please note that these pieces were made in very limited quantities and *may not* be one of a kind. See the order form below for quantities made of each piece. NOTE: Last year, 3 of 10 pieces auctioned were bought by absentee bids. So please join the fun even if you can't be at the convention!

Absentee bidding rules and instructions:

The Society is providing this absentee bidding process as a service for its members and can't be responsible for failure to execute such bids for any reason. Only current members of The Stretch Glass Society may submit bids. All bids must be submitted in writing, using the form below, and mailed (via the USPS) to the address shown below. **All bids must be received by May 1, 2000** to be included in the auction. On the form below, list the *maximum* bid you are willing to place on the pieces you are interested in. Note, all bids you submit will be executed, so only bid on the quantity of pieces you will be prepared to purchase. All bids will remain sealed until just prior to the auction. An appointed member of The Society will execute all bids on behalf of the absent members. In an attempt to avoid identical high bids we ask that your bids **not** be in whole dollar amounts. An example of a desired bid would be \$65.23. All successful high bids will be rounded down to the nearest whole dollar. If this method still results in identical bids, the bid received (postmarked) first will take precedence. All absentee bids are final and may not be rescinded without permission of The Society. A shipping, handling, and insurance fee of \$10.00 will be added to each successful absentee bid. Successful high bidders will be notified of their purchase with in 14 days of the end of the auction. Full payment must be received with in 14 days of being notified of being the high bidder. Bid on as many pieces as you like. **GOOD LUCK.** Please refer to the color photo page in this newsletter to select the piece(s) you would like to bid on and then fill out and mail the form below to:

The Stretch Glass Society has commissioned the Fenton Art Glass Company to produce a Limited Edition Piece for our 2000 Convention and Show. This years piece will be a **Flared Rib Optic Comport** in **Red Stretch Glass**. Each piece is approximately 5 1/4" tall. As in previous years, each piece will be marked on the bottom, identifying the piece as a Stretch Glass Society commissioned piece.

We have placed a preliminary order for 200 pieces, which should assure each SGS Member/Family at least one of these pieces. This preliminary quantity may be adjusted based on the orders received. Members may also order up to 9 additional pieces, which will be distributed after all members/families have received their first piece order and then based on availability and in the order in which your request was received.

If there are any pieces remaining after all the orders are filled, the remaining pieces will be sold to members/families on a first-come-first-serve basis at a higher price.

Duties of the SGS President

ARTICLE IX -- DUTIES:

1. Carry out the intentions as set forth in the Preamble of this Constitution,
2. To preside at all meetings of the Society,
3. To appoint necessary committees as permitted by this Constitution and by-laws here or hereinafter adopted, subject to approval of the Executive Board.
4. The President's duties shall be limited or expanded by directive of the Executive Board.
5. Vacancies of offices of Vice President, Secretary-Editor, or Treasurer may be filled by appointment by the President subject to the approval of the Executive Board.
6. In the event of a vacancy in the office of a Director, the President shall appoint to fill that vacancy, subject to the approval of the Executive Board, to serve until an election is held at the next Annual Meeting of the Society.
7. **The President shall be ex-officio member of the Executive Board and in the event of a tie in voting, shall then be entitled to vote.**

Section A -

1. The President shall call, at least, one meeting of the Executive Board immediately prior to the Annual Convention, but sufficiently in advance so that all pertinent business may be discussed and finalized.
2. Special meetings of the Executive Board may be called by the President and must be called by the Secretary-Editor upon written request of the majority of the Executive Board.

Section B -

1. All Presidents shall be active and participating members of the Executive Board for one (1) year after the expiration of their terms of office.

NON-SPECIFIED DUTIES

1. Call for Executive Board to review Constitution and bylaws by special communication (either verbal or written) three months prior to Convention. Proposed amendments to be sent, in writing, to President for inclusion in agenda.
2. Prepare Executive Board Meeting Agenda and distribute, if possible, two weeks prior to meeting (per Parliamentary Procedures).

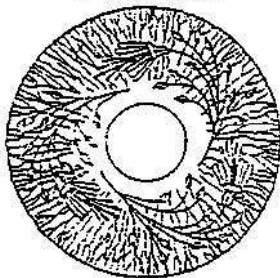

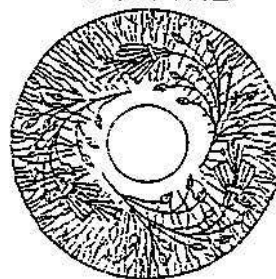
