(Co-)PRESIDENTS' MESSAGE

Dear Members:

We are delighted (and a little surprised) at the positive response to our letter and articles in this year's first newsletter! We weren't sure what the other members might like to see.

We've also had numerous requests for our video of the 1992 Convention(s). After viewing the video, most have expressed regret at not being able to attend. I hope that this will serve as an additional incentive to attend our Conference this next spring in Marietta, OH.

The article 'The 1992 Convention Show(s)' generated some interesting comments from some new as well as old members. Many were surprised at the variety of colors described. The opaque black, pearl blue and salmon colors haven't been seen by many. We encourage you to attend our next convention or request the video and

"experience" these rare pieces. We find that our members often walk by these pieces at shows and in markets because they don't fit the normal "image" of stretch glass.

Speaking of that article, Dave want's to correct a mistake. It was Michael and Carol Jasman from Louisiana who brought their display of "everything blue", not the Cordell's.

Now, we would like to address some questions posed by our membership as well as pose some questions of our own.

First, no one commented about how we, as a society, could best serve our membership. However, most of our communications have included comments on how the newsletter needs to provide more technical information and less on "travel logs" or "where I bought this or that". Personally, we find the travel logs fun to read but we also lust for technical information. We propose several methods to provide more technical information.

John Madeley has reviewed most of the past issues of the Stretch Glass Society Newsletter and he has pointed out that there are numerous gems of information buried among the pages. He suggests that we review some of these former articles and update them with our current knowledge of makers and names. We've looked over some of these and we can also improve on most of the illustrations.

We are still on our quest for making line drawings of known stretch glass pieces. We have included the latest of the candle stick drawings and hope that this kind of information will help with your technical questions on who made what. We are still missing most of the Imperial and Lancaster candle stick lines. Perhaps we can illustrate these during the next convention.

We have now started illustrating the Northwood line (only 80-some pieces!) and hope to have most of these done by next spring. We have about half of the total line because we like to collect Northwood russet and opaque blue. We'll include a list of the rest needed so that you can possibly bring examples to the next convention for illustrating.

We need questions from you, our membership. Most questions can be answered by our collective expertise. However, as most of you know, we rely heavily on experts such as Berry Wiggins, James Measell and Frank Fenton for the more difficult questions. So send us a card or letter with your question. If you have a unique piece which needs to be identified,

try to send a picture or a drawing for us to view.

Second, we have had some of our membership point out that it is very difficult to attend our conference during the week. We attempted to address this problem at our last convention, but we were voting with members who did not have much of a problem with a conference during the week. We know that we have teachers, doctors, lawyers as well as mechanics, line workers, and home makers with children in school. Many of these simply can not take off during the week without making difficult arrangements. Though we can not change our meeting for this next year, WE NEED FEED BACK ON YOUR WISHES.

John Madeley is currently negotiating to find a suitable site in the Chicago area for the 1994 converence. He needs to know if we are going to keep our current format or change. We need to let him know our wishes within the next couple of months.

PLEASE - send a postcard or letter stating whether you: A. prefer the current format (Thursday and Friday), B. prefer a weekend format (Friday set up and Saturday Show and banquet), or C. don't have a preference.

We can see advantages to either format. The Thursday-Friday format allows for attending other shows and flea markets. The Friday-Saturday format allows for more participation and makes US the important show.

Let us know your wishes. Have fun making those stretch glass finds!





Diamond Glass Co. Candlesticks





Fenton Candlesticks








Northwood Candlesticks




U.S. Glass Candlesticks








U.S. Glass - Twist


