We also received a letter from Berry Wiggins with the following good news-

"I have one more hurdle to overcome and I will be putting out a book on bases."

Berry had written to me to tell me that he was on another research trip and had determined that a base and bowl I had purchased and given to Berry while he is doing this research was made by Cooperative Flint Glass Company. These pieces, shading from red to a greenish-yellow, (that color description is mine...not Berry's) have been previously attributed to Cambridge Glass and called "tomato". Berry has apparently been able to establish that these two pieces are not Cambridge. There will probably be lots of argument on this opinion from other sources. Berry is probably used to this, though, and surely takes it in his stride.

Berry's last paragraph "Know you're finding some unusual pieces to show at the Stretch Convention". There are a few that I've found. One in particular elicits comment-oh's, ah's and some painful moans. It will be described later.

It is always great to hear from Berry, no matter how brief the letter is. It is like a private lesson about Stretch Glass as well as his comments from years of study and curiosity about Stretch Glass, all other glass and glass production and techniques. Thank you from each one of us, Berry!

We are certainly looking forward to this new book on the bases.

Messages to the Members from the Editor

When we received our last copy of the Glass Collector's Digest the flyer on the opposite page was included with our magazine. With permission of the Editor of the Glass Collector's Digest we reproduced the copy for you. At the last Fenton Glass meeting here we were told by a member that some of the glass belongs to a Stretch Glass member. We will pursue that and let you know if this is so.

Just this evening I called the Auctioneer, Mr. Ross Thomas, and he has a listing of the pieces for the auction and will mail a copy to us early next week. The coming Newsletter.

Mr. Ross suggested one correction — The Black Rose pieces listed under Baskets— are actually vases. There are two and one of these has painting on it. Mr. Ross also told us that both the Carnival and Stretch pieces are old pieces.

Hope that some of you may be able to attend this auction next month.

If I may be permitted this "editorial privilege"— One of the members of another glass club of which I am a member here in the Washington area was the author of an article in the first issue of the Glass Collector's Digest. A beautiful picture of one of his pieces of Moser glass graced the first cover of the Digest. All the members of this club were aware of this and that a new publication was being offered for glass collector's. Most everyone was anxious to have more information and they subscribed, beginning with that first issue. There have now been four issues—every other month. I have been very pleased, especially with the variety. The articles pertain to all kinds of glass. All of us are exposed to many different pieces of glass in our search for the ones we seek for our own collections or our business if we are dealers.

The publisher's address-Glass Collector's Digest; P.O. Box 553; Marietta, OH 45750. We have met the Editor at the publisher's office and spoken with him since, at the Duncan Miller Convention and over the telephone. The publisher has printed the Fenton Books, Bill Heacock's books and will be the Berry Wiggin's publisher for his book on bases. When the new Stretch Glass book is finished, it, too, will be printed and published under the Richardson name. We have all benefitted especially from the wonderful photographs that the publisher takes (\$15 per year - 10% discount or \$14.40 for glass club members - include this information with your check, please)

The thing that prompted all this information about the auction and the Digest was my desire to write you a bit about Berry's Stretch Glass article which appeared in the third issue. There are lots of surprises for us in the article and I wanted to review a few of them for you.

Berry confirms that he has seen "at least two pieces of old Stretch that had the crackled effect even though the pieces were not actually stretched in the manufacturing process". Berry suggests that if a piece is given a very

heavy spray of metallic salts and is then reheated to a very high temperature the stretched effect can be produced without shaping and stretching the piece.

Berry tells us that the earliest announcements for Stretch began in 1916 and 1917, though most of it was made during the 20's.

Berry also lists the known manufacturers of Stretch Glass, several more than are commonly listed. One of these is Vineland Flint Glass Company in New Jersey. Early in my collecting I found what I now believe is a piece of Vineland Stretch. My judgment is based on the photos in Berry's book. This piece, a rather strange and unattractive blue-grey color, is one I probably would have passed up when I later found Stretch pieces in the glorious colors that are available. But the size and shape are correct to perhaps be a Vineland piece. I have never had this particular piece with me at a Convention to ask our experts' opinion. Next time-for sure!

Berry also includes comment about a Vineland candleholder in brown slag which belongs to Rosa Schleede. Perhaps some of you have seen Rosa's piece. Wouldn't it be great to find one like it!

We will let you try to name all the companies and see how many you can come up with. Someone among you may have a piece that is made by some company that no one has discovered yet. What fun that would be!

Perhaps we can get some copies of this issue to have at the Convention. For those of you who might like to write the publisher, the article appeared in Volume 1 – Number 3, dated October/November 1987. Single issues are still available from the publisher at \$4.00 a copy. (Address is on page five)

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
