(Co-)PRESIDENTS' MESSAGE

Dear Members:

Can it be? Is it really 1996 already?! It will soon be time for our Convention and Show in Manassas, Virginia and we can't wait to see all of the dolphin pieces!

Remember that our theme this year is "Dolphins in Stretch Glass" So dust off any pieces that you have (we don't have many but we'll bring what we have), pack them up and bring them along. I know that some of our members may need a special truck to haul all their dolphin pieces but do your best. We always enjoy seeing what turns up when we have a theme for the show.

For our individual exhibit, we are still quarreling over whether we should bring all of our Northwood russet or jade blue (opaque blue). Guess you will have to wait and see which shows up!

We are also very excited to work with the Fenton Art Glass Company, and especially Frank M. Fenton, since they are going to make us another special piece of stretch glass - a twin dolphin "square-sided" bon-bon in cobalt blue

stretch. We've seen some of the new cobalt blue and black stretch made by Fenton and they have truly recovered the art of making exceptional stretch glass.

Speaking of new stretch glass, we recently saw some wisteria (dark purple) baskets made from a tumbler with its top widely flared out. The stretch was excellent and the color exceptional. Keep on the lookout for a piece but expect to pay \$35 to \$45 for one.

In response to our notice in the last newsletter, many of our new members have ordered one of the "seconds" of the 20th Anniversary twin dolphin fan vase. We appreciate your prompt orders and assume that you have received your orders OK. If you have not received your order, let us know immediately. We sent out most of the orders within two weeks of receiving your checks.

We have about five pieces left if there are any new members still wanting a piece.

In our last letter, we complained that we hadn't had much success in obtaining new additions to our collection. Well, we finally got out in November and it was a total devastation to our

check book!

First, Dave made it to the "Bill Crowl, Special Sale" in Chicago (November 4). He had to fight off many of the others in attendance for the chance to pick up some of the many pieces offered by Bill. His greatest prize was a large U.S. Glass footed comport in "Tiffin" blue. Tiffin blue is a term used by the Tiffin collectors to describe the light cobalt (royal) blue color of some of the U.S. Glass pieces. We also have a smaller comport and a footed bowl in the same color.

Bill also came up with another ribbon bowl in the U.S. "Salmon" color This is the yellow-orange slag glass color. Unfortunately, the piece had a tiny, tiny flake missing from the top rim Bummer! Dave was a bit scared that the other U.S. Glass green and yellow opaque colors were eagerly sought after by the Chicago crowd. We though that we were the only ones that "appreciated" these unique colors. Fortunately, he was able to scoop up the one large opaque green vase that had eluded our collection.

In mid-November, Dave had a trip to New Jersey and he was able to escape to some of the local antique malls between seminars. Again this proved to be a costly situation. He finally picked up a Diamond Glass "Egyptian Lustre" (black stretch) bowl from a mall where we have coveted the piece for three years! The dealer was finally present and willing to bring the price down to a reasonable (but not cheap) level.

During the third weekend of November, Dave again trekked to the Springfield, OH show in the cold and rain. Not expecting to find much since most of the dealers were the "old regulars," he was shocked to find an Imperial wide panel bowl, 13 inches in diameter, in RED! Yes, it was outside, in the cold and rain and the price was right. Another dealer inside had picked up several 6-inch Imperial Art Glass line bowls and they were reasonably priced.

Over the Thanksgiving holiday weekend, we went to Nashville to visit family and engorge ourselves with turkey and trimmings. Of course, we had to hit the local antique malls. Unfortunately, (or fortunately for our check book!) only a few small pieces were found. We did finally pick up the glass for the Northwood concave diamond guest set, in blue opaque. Now we need the pitcher.

The final blow to our savings occurred at the Scott Antique Show which was also in Columbus over the Thanksgiving weekend. We expected that all of our "competitors" would have cleaned out the show by the time that we arrived on Sunday However, we were pleasantly surprised to find another black stretch bowl, several smaller Imperial vases and bowls, and a blue Central Glass bowl with silver paint over some etching on its rim. We figured that most passed up the bowl because it just looked like "one of those big blue bowls" that we become too calloused to carefully inspect.

Over the Christmas/New Year period, we went to Florida to visit with our grandson (Oh, and our daughter and son-in-law too!). They are having a busy time with their new bagel store that they opened in Naples. If you get down there, look them up on 5th Avenue - Bully's Bagels. Ask for Scott or Norann and tell them Dave and Renee sent you.

One final note. We were both a bit disturbed by the new Fenton price listing recently published (for the Fenton, First 25 Years). Their stretch glass pricing "expert" isn't even a member of our society! You can guess what the prices are like! We would love to get some of the more rare pieces at the prices listed and would love to sell those common pieces at the high prices listed. We're already seeing the high prices listed for common pieces on stickers in antique malls and shows. We're also amazed at the number of dealers that think that they have to add another 10% to the book listing! Enough said. HAPPY NEW YEAR!



Common 9- to 10-inch Stretch Glass Bowls



Northwood #647 fruit or flower bowl (10-inch)

(base = 3 7/16-inch; shoulder = 4 7/16-inch)

Northwood #660 fruit bowl (9 3/4-inch)

(base = 3 7/8-inch; shoulder = 4 1/8-inch)

Common Nine to Ten-inch Stretch Glass Bowls by Dave Shetlar

Identifying the makers of a stretch glass piece can be difficult, especially when most of the manufacturers produced very similar pieces. The distinctiveness of comports, candle holders, perfumes, or candy jars make them easy to identify. However, bowls and plates can be quite confusing without some careful observations and measuring. I have illustrated many of the 9 to 10-inch bowls but some descriptions and hints for identification are necessary to complete the task of learning their makers. First, note that I have identified two important features, the base or foot diameter and the shoulder diameter and shape. The diameters of both the base and shoulder can change slightly depending upon the shaping of the upper part of the bowl. Remember that the upper part can be rolled in, kept straight, pulled up, flared out or rolled over (the common "flip bowl"). Some companies, especially Vineland, may have crimped or ruffled the top edge. In spite of all the modifications of the upper part, most bowls have the base and shoulder diameter remaining fairly constant, at least within 1/6- to 1/32-inch.

Two common bowls that are often confused are the Diamond and Lancaster "straight side" bowls. (Note: straight side is a term coined by Berry Wiggins to describe these bowls.) The Diamond example illustrated has the upper part flared out more than normal. The Diamond glass bowl has the foot with a wider flat surface and the shoulder is small but

straight sided. The Lancaster foot is rounded and the shoulder is more rounded. The base and shoulder diameters of each are also distinctly different.

The Vineland 10-inch bowl and the Fenton #600 look much alike with their wide, straight sided shoulders. The depression inside the foot is considerably deeper in the Vineland bowls. Again, with a caliper, the base and shoulder diameters are distinct.

The Diamond, Central and Northwood bowls look much alike but careful inspection will reveal their differences. The common Diamond 10-inch bowl is heavy to the feel and usually has a distinct mold line near the upper rim. The base is thick and the depression inside the foot is deep. The shoulder has a very tiny, often indistinct, straight sided shoulder The Central bowl is the lightest and most delicate of the group. The small base rim has a moderately deep depression inside and the shoulder is rounded down to a small straight sided section. The Northwood bowls have gracefully rounded shoulders. The #660 bowl had a deep depression inside the foot, like the Vineland bowl

The Northwood #647 (illustrated) and Fenton #647 (not illustrated) bowls are nearly identical. Both have a small base with only a slight depression inside. The shoulders are distinctly wider than the base, almost by ½-inch, around the diameter. They differe in that the Northwood bowl has the rounded shoulder but the Fenton bowl has a straight sided shoulder (as in the #600).


STRETCH GLASS SOCIETY CONVENTION '96 NEWS

APRIL 18, 19, & 20, 1996 -- MANASSAS, VIRGINIA

LOCATION: We will be meeting at the Best Western Hotel-Admiral's Inn Restaurant complex at 8640 Mathis Avenue in the City of Manassas, Virginia. Manassas is an historic, southern city of 28,000 with many wonderful restuarants. The Convention site is conviently located near I-81 and I-66, approximately 35 miles south west of Washington, DC. From I-66 take Va Route 28 south about 8 miles. Detailed maps and directions to the Convention will be included in the next issue of the Newsletter.

RESERVATIONS: It is important to make your hotel reservations early - remember, we are in a suburb of the Nation's Capital, a



tourist destination for millions of Americans every year. The hotel is holding a block of rooms for SGS members many of these are non-smoking, first floor rooms and are the rooms most in demand. These rooms will be held for SGS
members until March 15, 1996; after that date, SGS members will only be able to get rooms on an as-available basis.

Call (703) 368-7070 or use the hotel reservation form included in this newsletter to reserve a room now. The rate
is \$55 per night for up to four persons in a room. You may reserve for additional nights before or after the convention
at the same rate. The hotel will accept pets. Please remember to tell them you are with the Stretch Glass Society

SCHEDULE: The schedule of events for the Convention is included in this newsletter. Please review it carefully and note the various events in which you want to participate. Then plan your arrival and departure times to allow you to do everything you want to do. We are doing a lot of local promotion for this Convention and hope to attract many local collectors interested in learning about Stretch Glass. As you will see, we have made some changes in the Convention program, as well as tried to schedule all events so no one gets left out. Plan now to be with us from start to finish.

MEMBER DISPLAYS: Our showroom is large and the floorplan we are using provides lots of display space for everyone, including Bill Crowl--who has promised to bring several hundred pieces of rare and unusual stretch glass to sell. So plan to bring a nice, full exhibit of your stretch glass as well as your for sale pieces. The showroom is well-lighted and we will have plenty of covered, skirted tables for your use -- we have forty 8' tables reserved -- just let us know how many (up to 3 per member, free) you would like. The tables will be arranged booth style around the parameter of the room, making it possible to utilize some shelf units, if you want to bring them along. Please bring lets of glass to display.

<u>CLUB DISPLAY:</u> The Club display theme will be "**Dolphins theroughout the History of Glass.**" It will, of course, highlight stretch glass dolphins, but we will also display Early American Pressed Glass dolphins, Milk Glass dolphins, Jade dolphins, Cambridge dolphins and any others members bring. Please bring your dolphins so they may be part of our spectacular display. We would appreciate knowing, in advance, how many and what type of dolphin pieces you plan to bring because we are going to prepare tent cards identifying each piece of the display.

We are attempting to arrange for each of the over 50 items in the Club display to be individually photographed. Sets of the photgraphs will be available for sale to Club members. We expect to provide a list identifying each dolphin piece, its dimensions and an estimated value. The cost for a set of photographs complete with the list is expected to be between \$20 and \$25. We need an indication of the level of interest in purchasing these sets of photos, so please indicate your level of interest on the enclosed Club Display Information form.



A Twin-Dolphin "Square-Sided" Bon-Bon in Cobalt Blue Stretch

We have contracted with the Fenton Art Glass Company to produce a limited edition piece for our 1996 Convention and Show. Only Stretch Glass Society members qualify to obtain one of these pieces in elegant cobalt blue stretch glass!

The "square-sided" term is used by the Fenton Art Glass Company to describe the flaring out of the opening with four sides being pulled downward. We have tried to illustrate how this piece will look with a half sized drawing. A better illustration is found in the Fenton Glass: The first twenty-five years on page 68 (fig. 411). (Our piece will not have the diamond optic interior) The bon-bon is very delicate and elegant. The base of each piece will be marked "SGS-96."



We are expecting that about 200 pieces will be made though a few more may be available. As with our 20th Anniversary piece, in red stretch, we will guarantee that each Stretch Glass Society member/family will be able to obtain one of these pieces if you get in your order by the deadline. After the deadline, remaining pieces will be available to members wishing to purchase up to 9 more (10 total), on a first come, first served basis.


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


