Dear Mary Louise,

I'm enclosing the only obituary that has appeared in the Akron Beacon-Journal of the death of our dear and long-time friend, Joe Presznick.

As it says, it was sudden, and came as a great surprise to us as do all sudden deaths. We just can't believe it happened. We received his Christmas card with the usual note inside and I had just talked to him by phone before Christmas. We are sorry to lose Joe and shall miss him greatly. He and Rose had been close friends for a very long time and their friendship has been treasured by both Jabe and me. They were the pioneers in collecting, researching and furthering Carnival Glass.

It was always such a pleasure to visit with them in their home and talk about Carnival Glass, enjoy seeing their vast collection in their museum and any recent acquisitions they had added, and enjoying the good food that always seemed to abound at their home.

They were instrumental in getting our local Carrival Glass organization off the ground in 1969 and agreed with our selection of the name "The Bicksler Carnival Glass Club". After Rose left us we added the name Presznick to the Club name, this in a way paying a bit of homage to the two families who were so close in friendship and adding "antiques" to the name in order to expand interest in other things besides just Carnival Glass alone. It became "The Bicksler-Presznick Carnival Glass and Antiques Club" of Loyal Oak, Ohio, with a membership of almost one hundred collectors.

Rose drew the logos for the Stretch Glass Society which is still in use and I insisted that she put her initials somewhere inside the drawings so there would never be any question about who drew those logos. She and Joe were also the original organizers, along with Berry Wiggins, Jabe Tarter, the Dr. Davis' of Canada. along with others of the Stretch Glass Society in 1974 at Denver, Pennsylvania.

It had been Rose's intention to do a lot of research on Stretch Glass but others carried the ball as her health began to deteriorate. There is so much that all iridescent glass collectors need to be thankful for to those two pioneers that it is now quite difficult to even remember a lot of what they actually did, and so much that will never be known now. For one: Did anyone ever know that Rose, all by herself, was instrumental in getting that white line painted on most roads on the right-hand side which is such a help to every driver, especially when driving in fog? She started the fight to have it done right from her home and now it must have spread all across the country-without credit to Rose Presenick.

Joseph Presznick 1913 – 1986

Joseph Presznick, 73, of Lodi, died suddenly Friday, December 26, 1986 at the Lodi Community Hospital.

Born in New York City, N.Y., he had lived in Wadsworth, residing the past 45 years in Lodi. He was a retired Postmaster from the Lodi Post Office, and was a member of many Masonic Organizations.

He is survived by sister, Leda Birow, of Barberton; brother, Peter, of Charleston. S.C.; stepdaughter Elaine Monachino of Lyndhurst. He was preceded in death by his wife, Rose, in 1978.

Funeral services Monday, 1 PM at Parker & Son Funeral Home, Lodi. Burial in Woodland Cemetery, Wadsworth, Ohio.



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Letters from Members

Joanne Rodgers sent the following information to us with her President's Message.

"More information on Stretch Glass with cut patterns:--

I have a green covered candy with the grape pattern as seen in Umbraco's Book, page 59 - XII 197. Also, a white Imperial compote like the one pictured in Berry's book on page 11, # 1692, cut # 105. I sure would like to find the underplate to match.

The candy dish was purchased in 1974 for \$12.50 from a dealer in Norwalk. Ohio.

The compote was purchased from a dealer in Birmingham, Ohio, for \$12.00 in 1975.

I began collecting Stretch Glass in early 1972. In 1974 we moved to Monroeville, Ohio and I discovered Jamie's Flown Market in Amherst, Ohio, and a number of small rural towns where antique shops were located. In the two years we lived in Manroeville I made 56 purchases of Stretch Glass, either individual pieces or sets. Until today I had never tallied up purchases made during that time. I was astounded. At the time I did not realize what a bonanza I had struck. I must have cleaned them out."

(Editor's note:- Joanne, can we get a drawing of the cut from you? Perhaps some one has just the underplate and would part with it. If anyone has this set, the compote and underplate, with or without the cutting, please send us some information on the size of the underplate for Joanne.)

Berry Wiggins made a special request in our last Newsletter that members coming to the Convention please bring their "frogs" - also known as flower blocks. We wrote to Berry asking what kind of frogs he wishes to examine. Berry's reply -

"Iridized Frogs <u>only</u> will give me enough troubles. It is amazing how many Stretch Companies made the Frogs."

And we asked Berry about the existence of a red Stretch bowl with dolphins that was described to me by a glass collector-

"On the Dolphin Fan Vases and the dolphin Triplets Bowl, I've seen the Fan Vase in Red Ruby but never have I seen the Dolphins in Red Stretch, nor have I heard of any in either the Fan Vase or anything with dolphins."

Berry's project last year was a display of black bases and a lesson for all of us on this topic. Quite amazing. I had brought a bowl and matching base in what has been referred to as "Tomato" color, hoping that someone could identify the pieces for me at the Convention. Berry included a personal note to me about the bowl and base. Berry's request follows.

"Sometimes you outsmart yourself and that's what I did last year when I took your amberina base and didn't take the bowl with it. If you will, I'd like to borrow same. One night of the Fenton Convention is for identification and it is fantastic. Mr. Fenton and Bill H. (Heacock) do the I D and I help a little on the Stretch. They (Fenton Convention people) weed out all the glass

that can be easily identified and the rest goes for I D."

Berry, of course, you may have my "tomato" bowl for study. We all delight in your research. It makes us seem so smart when we repeat what we learn from you.

Berry's letter continues with these findings about cardlesticks.

"This winter I put all my boxes in order and went over every piece of glass. One day I had about ten Northwood 8 1/2" Colonial candlesticks on my desk and all of a sudden it hit me that one was different. After much looking and measuringthere are two different Mr. N. (Northwood) 8 1/2" candlesticks. It could be two different molds but I doubt it.

A few days later I found two different candlesticks - 8 1/2" in Ferton and have sent one of each to Mr. Ferton for him to study until I see him. All being well, I'll see him just before the Convention if both our schedules are okay for that time.

The difference in the candlesticks is just in and around the knots on the Mr.N. candlesticks. Of course, Fenton does not have the knot but the big difference is in the same area. With close measuring you can find other differences, too. (The knot Berry describes is the life saver-like area between the foot or base part and the stem of the candlestick.)

When you try to compare measurements on glass always remember hot glass when handled can change."

In response to our request last Newsletter for information about member Carole Jasman's covered pitcher, tumblers and coasters (tumbler was 'illustrated') Berry sent the following measurements and even a bit of advice.

"The Concave Diamond Ice Tea Pitcher is 9 1/2" high with no lid and 11 3/4" with lid. The part that rests on the table is 4 1/2" wide. The tumbler is 4 1/2" high, 2 1/2" on the base. The pitcher is very delicate so handle it with care and never pick this type of pitcher up by the handle. The lid for the pitcher and the tumblers are tough and you can find them. The pitcher with lid is priced at \$250.00 in Blue. The coasters are rare and in a light blue. Northwood coasters are almost identical with Fenton but Fenton are in cobalt blue. Coasters are not iridized at all. The value of the coasters is at least \$15.00 each. Tumblers are around \$25.00 each for Mr. N.'s Concave Diamond.

The 1916 to 1918 time (referred to by Carole as the time her grandmother received the set as a premium from a tea company) is close. We have no proof on the date. I'd say anywhere between 1916-1920, so we are close together.

It is one outstanding set. There is no information on the Tea Company that used these sets as premiums.

We do know these sets were made in Blue, Vaseline and Russet. How do we know it was made in Russet? I have a tumbler."

Well Berry, now we all want to see that tumbler at the Convention so we will know what color Mr. R.'s Russet is!

Berry's last paragraph is another request for all of us.

"Bring odd pieces. I love to see them, especially the slag.

"You know some of the dolphin fan vases had frogs. All being well see you at Convention.

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
