

# Stretch Glass Society Newsletter October, 1998

(Co-) Presidents' Message



#### Dear Members:

Toddlers are tiring! And if you think they are tiring as parents, try being the grandparents of a pair—one three and the other 1-and a half! We didn't know what it meant to feel old until spending time with the grandkids this summer. We were EVEN too tired to look much for stretch glass! (OK, it was too hot in Florida to get out very much!) Fortunately, before heading back home we spent a couple of days "R & R" in Titlsville, Florida where Dave gave some classes for an international turf program and Renee did a little searching.

We had seen an announcement about a Depression Glass Show in Sanford; so on our way to Titisville, we went to take a look. We saw some really beautiful glass and even a few pieces of stretch. This was on a Friday evening; Saturday was Dave's teaching day, so Renee was on her own. She is much slower than Dave (thorough, depending on which one you ask) so was only able to "do" a few locales. She did Renninger's in Mt. Dora, then went on into Mt. Dora and "did" the shops there. Got caught in a downpour while there and had to take refuge in a nice little restaurant to have a bowl of soup (likely story)! From there she was only able to make it to two more mails in the Orlando area. By then, she was exhausted. We had to head out the next day (Sunday)--Dave off to the Azores and Renee back home to Delaware, Ohio. We only made two purchases of stretch on this trip—an Imperial Rose Ice (marigold), center handled fruit bowl etched with the fuchsia-like flower and a nice Northwood white lamp shade (drapery pattern).

We also got a quick trip into the Houston area in early August to visit Dave's folks and sisters. Between hooking up an Internet server, and doing various household repairs, we were able to check out most of the major antique mails. There was little new stretch in the mails, but we were lucky enough to find a Fenton curtain optic tumbler. You never know where a choice piece will show upt

We went on several "road trips" to deliver some of the new stretch books to Ohioans who donated pieces to be photographed. Mildred and Wes Bicksler even provided lunch and we had a good visit. They were sorry that they hadn't been able to get to the Convention in Chicago, but we caught them up on the goings on. Wes had been having some health problems but seems to be in excellent shape now. We then headed up to deliver a book to Paul Miller (our first SGS Newsletter Editor). We had never been to Paul's house, and the Bickslers hinted that we would be in for a treat.

Paul has a quaint house in the middle of Akron. It's exterior gives no hint of the treasures within. Paul has carried on his friend's (Jabe Tarter) passion for collecting glass - not just stretch glass, but ALL kinds of glass. We thought that all their glass had been moved into the museum at Kent State, but we were definitely wrong. Paul keeps several items of almost every kind of glass. Since he is a great fan of many modern glassmakers who have rediscovered hand made glass, he has prime collections of glass made by small companies that were active in the 60s, 70s, and 80s. We were also treated to the nuances of paperweights. In Paul's hands, each paperweight has a story to tell. Oh, yes, Paul has a small collection of stretch glass that he continues to add to occasionally and lends out to us glass researchers for documentation.

We also borrowed copies of Jabe Tarter's books "What is it Jabe?" to copy for Glen and Stephen Thistlewood in England (major collectors and scholars of carnival glass). We "met" the Thistlewoods on-line through our involvement with the Woodsland Carnival Glass group. They produce a quarterly journal on carnival glass called "Network".

Speaking of on-line....we notice that more and more of our members are turning up on the Internet. At present, the on-line auction house, eBay, seems to be the most active site with a regular selection of stretch glass. eBay is a regular auction, but other dealers have stretch glass listed on their web pages. We have been able to get some nice pieces (especially ones that are not labeled as stretch glass), but it really takes time to search them out.

The only problem that we have with bidding on the Internet is that we probably don't know all the nicknames and addresses of the other bidders and sellers. We generally dislike bidding against fellow stretch glass members, but in auctions - high bidder wins the goods. Keep that in mind when you are bidding! We certainly want to keep our members on Friendly Terms!

We've also discovered several of our members selling stretch on the Internet. We think it's great exposure for stretch glass. Besides providing a venue for selling your glass (to buy more extraordinary stretch pieces), the Internet gives you a chance to share your knowledge and love of this wonderful glass. Now that some of you have gotten your feet wet selling on-line, look for more on this topic elsewhere in this newsletter.

Work has also begun on constructing a web site for our Society. At present, we are planning to have a general opening page that identifies and defines stretch glass and the Stretch Glass Society. Eventually we would like to have pages on stretch glass colors, identification of confusing pieces, space for posting pieces for identification, and a place for posting glass wanted or for sale (members ONLY). Even those members who don't have a computer (and might not care if they ever get one) could participate in buying/selling/trading stretch on this page by sending good quality photos for scanning to our "site coordinator". There is also the possibility that we can develop a chat room where our computer members could meet on-line once a week. We currently join in the Woodsland carnival glass chat room (Wednesday and Saturday nights) on a regular basis and really enjoy it. Everyone is very willing to share their tricks of using the computer, making digital pictures, and finding Internet sites. Now then, are there any computer gurus among our membership who have additional ideas that you are willing to share with us for our web site? Contact us!

Dave gave a talk on "Stretch Glass Colors and Lines Made by U.S. Glass" to the Tiffin Glass Collectors Club in September. They were quite pleased to see the wide range of colors attributed to U.S. Glass and were very interested in seeing how stretch glass was made (using the video of the making of the 1997 black stretch comport). During this meeting, Dave learned that author Jerry Gallagher (Tiffin Glass) had died of cancer. We "met" Jerry on the Internet last spring but we were unaware of his health problems.

The Society also lost two members this year. We were notified this spring that Margaret Kimple (nearly our next door neighbor in Westerville, OH) and, in the first week of October, Joanne Dolby (long-time member from Lambertville, MI) had died of cancer and kidney failure. Our deepest sympathies go to Eldon and the families of these two wonderfully sharing women.

We continue to wish Augusta Keith a speedy recovery. During a recent fall, Augusta broke a couple of vertebrae. Ouch!!

Apparently there was some confusion about the availability of past club pieces. At the Business Meeting, Dave stated that he thought that there were still some seconds of the red fan vases. Renee wasn't at the meeting to correct him! So, the only past pieces that are still available are the square, cobalt blue comports. Believe it or not, we've seen the signed red piece on eBay already! Remember, we have had four souvenir pieces since 1994 (except for 1995 because the membership voted against having one). We have had red, blue, black, and purple (sounds like describing an injury doesn't it)! Stay tuned though, Jim Steinbach will be announcing the 25th Anniversary Piece in our January newsletter. There will again be an ordering deadline and the "first to order, first to fill" rule will be in effect. Though Jim and Frank Fenton are working on selecting a piece that can be "guaranteed" to be made in sufficient quantity to fulfill our needs, NOTHING is certain when making stretch glass!

The 25th Annual Convention Show and Sale is progressing nicely with a few changes being made in the traditional schedule. Wednesday, April 28th is "Early Bird" arrival day; the 29th is "Members ONLY" day with the Infamous Members' Sale, Friday night will be the Business Meeting and Saturday night will be the Banquet, Program and Whimsey Silent Auction. Be sure to mark your calendars NOW, April 29, 30 and May 1, 1999, for the 25th ANNIVERSARY Convention Show and Sale at The Lafayette Hotel in Marietta, Ohio.

Over the past few months Dave has been illustrating the Imperial Art Glass Line ("Jewels"). Unfortunately, we don't have all the pieces in this line so, we are looking for some of the missing pieces to illustrate. We will try to get the drawings we have finished into the January newsletter and if you have any pieces not shown, try to bring them to the Marietta Convention for us to draw. 

## eaturing: Northwood's "Tree of Life" Stretch Glass

#### Isn't it impressive!! All Tree of Life!!!

Dave Shetlar had the line drawings completed and ready for me at Convention in April. I had asked John Madeley, that between our collections, would be photograph the "Tree of Life" stretch glass for the October issue. And here they are.....

During your "hunts", I am sure you may have seen some of these pieces. The #807, russet square, cupped, crimped bowl, and the cupped rose bowl are not easily found. The emerald green and royal purple pieces are even tougher to find and desirable to collectors. Recently, there was a Northwood royal purple "tree of life" stretch bowl for sale on Ebay, an Internet auction site. The "Jack in the Pulpit" pieces are desirable, because of their shape and are one of my favorities as well as the cake plates. The pearl cake plate is scarce. The combination of colors, bowls and comports can be of a fairly large nature, when you consider the color and style combinations with blue, darkblue, blue-green, dark green, marigold, pearl (white), royal purple, russet and topaz. "Tree of Life" pieces, recognized by their octagonal base, square base, and 12-sided base, can be found plain or with the "Tree of Life" design. The plain base pieces are not as near as abundant as the tree of life base design. Note, the versatility of the #605 piece.

For reference and study, I have used the following two books: Harry Northwood, The Wheeling Years, 1901-1925 by Heacock, Measell, and Wiggins and American Iridescent Stretch Glass by Madeley and Shetiar, which does have prices listed on various styles and colors. ENJOY!!!!



# FIRST EVER ONLINE CATALOGUED AUCTION OF

# **AMERICAN COLLECTIBLE GLASS**

January 11 to 25, 1999

Collector Online and Ontique, two Internet sites specializing in collectibles, are combining for an auction project consisting solely of American collectible glass. This alone does not make the effort unique. The uniqueness is in their recognition of the influence of the glass collecting community. This recognition is in the form of their directly involving many regional and national American Collectible Glass organizations.

The premise is that because most clubs meet just once a year there are few opportunities for members to buy and sell their glass to great numbers of fellow collectors. Many groups have "member only" auctions, but again, that is usually only once a year. The proposal made by *Collector Online* and *Ontique* is to provide an outlet which will allow glass lovers to buy and sell online to complement their club's activities. They are hoping that interest will prove great enough to warrant a twice-a-year online auction.

The manner in which they are involving the glass clubs is by bringing together at least 20 American Collectible Glass clubs as co-sponsors. The clubs will not be asked to provide financing, but to commit to consign glass. If the club can consign more than 10 but less than 20 pieces/lots, the normal selling fees (around 3%) will be donated directly to the club's Treasury. If the club consigns more than 20 lots to the auction, the donation will be increased to 5% of the final selling price.

This announcement only summarizes the project and members interested in more information about consigning glass for this auction should contact *Ontique* at 1-800-400-7079. Consignments will be accepted starting in November and ending on December 28th. You do NOT need to have a computer or be online yourself, but you WILL need to provide clear photos, item descriptions, and the lowest bid you will accept for each lot.

The Stretch Glass Society Officers and Board voted on whether or not we, as a club should participate. The vote, however, was split. Therefore, we are offering this information to the membership at large, and each of you may decide for yourselves. If, after communicating with the folks at *Ontique*, any SGS members elect to try the auction, PLEASE contact the Shetlars so that they can keep appropriate records. 
## "American Iridescent Stretch Glass"


