Joanne Dolby writes that she had hoped to contribute more for the newsletters but that there doesn't seem to be much Stretch Glass around to write about and she asks the question "Do you suppose we are all hoarding these pieces". However, I will say Joanne has done very well in sending in items to be used. I quote from one letter received from her in September:

"We saw Joe Mattis at a Springfield Show but it was the last day and he had already packed his Stretch Glass. It was a big show but we only saw lidded candy jars in Stretch. Later at Tecumseh, MI, there's a big antique store and we bought two matching white Stretch candlesticks. I do like the plainness of these low candlesticks as they look like the satiny finish of Verre de Soie. There was also a gold set exactly like the white ones but I chose the white. The price was nominal within reason. Another time we went to an Estate sale and there found a beauty. It was among lots of other beauties, all expensive Art Glass, so I figured the collector knew this piece was also worth something. This ll" plate, almost a bowl, was the deepest green I ever saw in Stretch Glass and the narrow foot was blue aurene. They came down on the price for me, thank goodness, as the original price tag was pretty high. Now I can't wait to show it to our other Stretch Glass collectors.

There is a new antique shop in Findlay-Jeffry's or Jefferies. It's a big place but the only Stretch I found was on a buffet with a huge price on it. If I remember correctly they were the same low candlesticks I just bought plus a round bowl between them. So, as I started this letter, there doesn't seem to be much Stretch Glass around to purchase."

Another from Joanne written in October:

"Yesterday a lady came by with some unique Stretch Glass plates. They were blue opalescent, 8 inches, but where a pontil would be, it had a round piece extended out (like a 50 cent piece laid on the bottom of the plate). Have you ever seen any of these? Very pretty. The price was \$50.00 for the four".

Now my question is could these be an imported reproduction as we have a red piece (hat shape I'll say) with about a  $25 \, \text{¢}$  flat mark on the bottom and we were told it's from Germany.

We correspond with Berry Wiggins regularly, but it is always better in person. Can't wait till the new book on Diamond comes out that Berry is co-author. Also the second Northwood book. Both books will help stretch glass collectors tremendously.

Talking about helping stretch glass collectors, Frank and Bill Fenton are at the top of the list. We are so lucky to have such knowledgeable people willing to take the time to help with every question. The Fenton Museum is wonderful and just loaded with stretch glass both common and rare pieces for everyone to enjoy. It was very refreshing in today's world to see the whole Fenton family (several generations) working together at the Fenton Glass Company. On the trip we visited the sites of the Imperial and Fostoria factories. It was sad to see them both closed. Glad that the Fenton Company is owned and operated by the family.

After stopping at hundreds of antique shops, not that much stretch glass was to be found. One notable piece is a white octagonal Laurel Leaf plate with an acid etched Steuben mark on the base. Several of us have been doing research on it and what is found we'll let you know. Frank Fenton said that all he could find is the round pieces of Laurel Leaf that Fenton made such as the mayonnaise, cheese and cracker set, and he said round plates. So far no one has heard of round Laurel Leaf plates except for the cracker plate with the embossed ring in the center. Do any SGS members have any round Laurel Leaf plates?


